The Season of Advent

Advent is a Latin word that means "coming." The season of Advent is the four week period before Christmas that the Church uses to remember the "coming" of the Christ. We celebrate that he came once as a baby in Bethlehem, and that he will come again at the end of time.

Traditionally, in Advent, the Gloria and other songs of praise are not sung during worship. The astute worshiper will notice this mirrors our practice of Lent. The high festival of Easter is preceded by a six-week period of preparation known as Lent. Likewise, the high festival of Christmas is preceded by a four-week period of preparation known as Advent. Both seasons — Lent and Advent — have a solemn and penitential nature. Both seasons – Lent and Advent – serve to refocus our eyes on the amazing grace and boundless love of our Savior.

Our Worship Series

This is a busy time of year. There is much to do to prepare for the celebration of Jesus' birth. However, more important than celebrating Jesus' first coming is being prepared for his second coming on the Last Day. Christmas is only important because of what it means for us at the end of time. In this worship series, we make the connection between Christ's first coming as Savior and his second coming as Judge. Our worship follows this pattern.

An Explanation of Our Communion Practice

Today we are celebrating the Lord's Supper, or Holy Communion. This is marked as "The Sacrament" in the worship folder. While some churches invite all who are present to receive the Sacrament ("open communion"), we follow the Biblical and historic Christian practice of "close communion".

What does this mean? We invite all who are members of our congregation (Good Shepherd Lutheran) or visitors who belong to our WELS fellowship to receive the Lord's Supper with us. If you have no church membership or belong to a different fellowship, faith, or even a different Lutheran church body (e.g. ELCA, LCMS, etc.), we ask that you please refrain from communing with us for now.

In asking this, we in no way mean to judge your faith or imply that you are not a Christian or "not good enough for us"! Rather, it is because God's Word teaches us to regard Communion as an outward expression of unity in *all* areas of the faith *(see 1 Corinthians 10:17)*. In other words, when we commune together, we are confessing publicly that we are all one in what we believe and profess (*all* the teachings of God's Word, not just a few basics).

For those who haven't had a chance to check out all that we teach and believe and declare their unity with us by joining our congregation, we look forward to informing you about what we believe and teach before you enjoy the Lord's Supper with us. We want you to feel comfortable with what we confess, and want you to enjoy the beauty of a deep unity in the faith.

There are other reasons for "close communion" as well:

- While God's Word promises that in the Lord's Supper we receive the beautiful gifts of Jesus' body and blood and forgiveness, it also warns that any communicant who does not recognize that the body and blood of Christ really are present in the Sacrament may bring spiritual harm on himself or herself (*see 1 Corinthians 11:27-29*). It wouldn't be loving for us to let that happen as it might if we offered the Sacrament to all, even to those who may not understand what is involved.
- Scripture also requires that each communicant examine himself or herself spiritually (*1 Corinthians 11:28*) before receiving the Lord's body and blood together with the bread and wine. There are many who are not able to do that due to their youth, lack of instruction, or other reasons.

We believe that it is out of obedience to our Lord and his Word and out of loving concern for everyone present that we practice "close communion." We hope that you understand and we trust that you will respect our practice. We look forward to any opportunity we may have in the future to share with you the Bible's teachings about Communion, our beliefs as a church, and to establish unity together and to commune together. We are grateful to have you worship with us, and long to grow in the Word together!



Confession and Absolution


- M: God is with us today as we worship and look forward to the coming of Emmanuel, our Savior Jesus.
- C: He is the Light of the world, the Light no darkness can overcome.

- M: As we come into the presence of God, we ask Him to look away from the darkness of our sins and illumine us with the saving light of His son, Jesus.
- C: Holy and merciful Father, I was born in the darkness of sin. I have failed to obey You perfectly and have failed to love others as I should. For this I deserve to be left in darkness. But trusting in Emmanuel, my Savior Jesus, I pray that You forgive my sins and lead me to the light of Your salvation.
- M: Indeed, God has been merciful to us. He sent His Son, as foretold by the prophets of old, to live perfectly for us, to die for our sins, and to rise from the dead to give us life and light. Because of God's perfect Son, we are seen as God's perfect children. Your sins are forgiven, you are a dearly loved child of God through Emmanuel, your Savior Jesus.

C: Arise, shine! For our light has come!

- M: This is the light whose coming was prophesied in the Old Testament. As the prophet Isaiah declared:
- C: The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death, a light has dawned.
- M: We now join those prophets of old and, with hearts full of hope, look forward to His coming again. With all believers we say,

We Listen

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

¹ This is what Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem: ² In the last days the mountain of the LORD's temple will be established as the highest of the mountains; it will be exalted above the hills. and all nations will stream to it. ³ Many peoples will come and say, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the temple of the God of Jacob. He will teach us his ways, so that we may walk in his paths." The law will go out from Zion, the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. ⁴ He will judge between the nations and will settle disputes for many peoples. They will beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore. ⁵ Come, descendants of Jacob, let us walk in the light of the LORD.

Dedication of the Advent Wreath

M: At this time we dedicate the Advent Wreath to the glory of God. It will be used in worship throughout the Advent and Christmas Season. It will serve to visually remind us of the blessings given to us by our greatest gift – our Savior Jesus.

At the base is a garland of green, reminding us that Jesus is our Living God, the author and source of life, and the one who will give eternal life to all who believe. As he declares in John 14:6,

C: "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." M: This garland is in a circle, without distinguished beginning or end. This reminds us that Jesus has no beginning or end, but reigns forever as our Savior and King. As he declares in Revelation 1:8,

C: "I am the Alpha and the Omega, who is, and who was, and who is to come, the Almighty."

M: In the center of the wreath are candles. Their flames will remind us that Jesus is the Light of the world, the light no darkness can overcome. As the prophet Isaiah declares,

C: "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned."

M: We will light a new candle each Sunday in Advent, symbolizing our growing anticipation of the celebration of our Savior's birth and his coming again. As the apostle John declares in Revelation 22:20,

C: "He who testifies to these things says, 'Yes, I am coming soon.' Amen. Come, Lord Jesus."

- M: We pray: Dear Jesus, bless our worship this Advent season. In the midst of hectic schedules and many pressures, may we find a refuge for our souls in your renewing Word. Fill our hearts with your peace, and increase our joy as we look forward to your coming again. In your name we pray,
- C: Amen.

Lighting of Advent Candle¹

- M: We light one Advent candle, remembering Jesus, who is coming again. He will come to gather his people from everywhere, both the living and the dead.
- C: We remember Jesus, who will come at the end of time. None of us know what day that will be.
- M: We hear his call to watch.
- C: We light one Advent candle as a sign of our watchfulness and waiting.
- M: Come, Lord Jesus, be our guest.
- C: Through your Word and Spirit may our souls be blessed.

¹The Advent Wreath is a combination of two very common symbols: light and the fir tree. From the early centuries of Christianity it has been the practice to represent Christ by a burning candle. The fir tree has a long history of religious use. No doubt the Advent Wreath was suggested by the Christmas tree. It seems that the Advent Wreath originated a few hundred years ago among the Lutherans of eastern Germany. A wreath of evergreens, made in various sizes, was either suspended from the ceiling or placed on a table. Four candles representing the four Sundays of Advent were fastened to the wreath. Eventually the use of the Advent Wreath became widespread and moved also from the home into the church. The general symbolism of the Advent Wreath lies in the growing light of the wreath, increasing each week as we approach the birthday of Jesus, the Light of the world. In the flame of the flickering candle, we see a hint of the starry light That led the shepherds and kings to the Tiny Child. We wait. We wait.

In the flame of the flickering candle, we see the promise of hope and joy; the promise of peace, the promise of love in a Baby Boy. We wait. We wait.

Advent candle, burning bright, gently reflecting heaven's light, lead us to the Prince of Peace; O guide us to the Perfect Light.

We long to bow before our Savior; we long to hear His precious voice; we long to worship the King of kings and at His appearance rejoice! We wait. We wait.

Gospel: Matthew 24:36-44

³⁶ "But about that day or hour no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. ³⁷ As it was in the days of Noah, so it will be at the coming of the Son of Man. ³⁸ For in the days before the flood, people were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, up to the day Noah entered the ark; ³⁹ and they knew nothing about what would happen until the flood came and took them all away. That is how it will be at the coming of the Son of Man. ⁴⁰ Two men will be in the field; one will be taken and the other left. ⁴¹ Two women will be grinding with a hand mill; one will be taken and the other left.

We believe in one holy Christian and apostolic Church.


We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.




